

~ Events of January ~

This Month (January), in 1861, the Union merchant ship, the Star of the West, was fired upon as it tried to deliver supplies to Fort Sumter in Charleston Harbor, South Carolina. This incident was the first time shots were exchanged between North and South, although it did not trigger the Civil War.

When South Carolinians seceded from the Union on December 20, 1860, they demanded the immediate withdrawal of the Federal garrison at Fort Sumter. President James Buchanan refused to comply, but was also careful not to make any provocative move. Inside the fort, Major Robert Anderson and his 80 soldiers needed supplies. The Buchanan administration decided to dispatch a civilian ship, the Star of the West, instead of a military transport, in order to keep tensions from flaring.

The Star of the West left New York on January 5, 1861. After the ship was en route, Secretary of War Joseph Holt received a dispatch from Anderson saying that the garrison was safe and supplies were not needed immediately. Anderson added that the secessionists were building gun emplacements overlooking the main shipping channel into Charleston Harbor. Holt realized that the ship was in great danger and a war might erupt. He tried in vain to recall the Star of the West, and Anderson was not aware that the ship continued on its way.

On the morning of January 9, Star of the West's captain John McGowan steered the ship into the channel near the fort. Two cannon shots roared from a South Carolina battery on Morris Island. They came from gunner George E. Haynsworth, a cadet at The Citadel in Charleston.



The shots represented the opening salvo of the war. More shots were fired, and the ship suffered a minor hit. Anderson watched from Fort Sumter but did not respond in support of the ship. If he had, the war might have started on that day.

The incident resulted in strong talk on both sides, but stopped short of war. The standoff at Fort Sumter continued until the Confederates attacked in April, triggering the Civil War.

CELEBRATING NEW YEARS AS A CONFEDERATE SOLDIER

History tells us how difficult it was for our confederate soldiers to be away from home and still be able to celebrate New Years
The citizens of Richmond, came together to help the soldiers celebrate Christmas that later turned in to New Years as well. This
was done in order to thank them for the months of hard work protecting the Confederate capital, during the Petersburg siege

News reached the Richmond newspapers who quickly promoted a food drive from all over the city. Word soon reached the soldiers and the Confederate camps that soon delighted to learn of the efforts over the pending feast.

This feast took place on January 2nd of 1865, since New Year's Day fell on Sunday. The cry for more food and supplies for this feast continued, but seemed to be falling short. When the time came to distribute the food there was hardly enough for a bite of food per soldier.

The dinner consisted of three turkeys, two ducks, one chicken and ninety loaves for 350 soldiers. Not a mouthful a piece. It was all gone, but where? The commissioners and quartermasters are the ones who were believed got it. Lord, have mercy on the poor soldiers.

There was much discontent from the New Year's dinner as was found in the diaries of many confederate soldiers and letters they wrote back home.

Perhaps the failed New Year's dinner was a fitting start to 1865. The Confederacy only had a few short months left to live.

"To those hungry soldiers, a feast for them that never happened, a New Year that was disappointing to those who gave so much"

Important Dates in Lincoln's War to Prevent Southern Independence

Jan. 8, 1861 On January 8, the Union garrison at Fort Barrancas fired on a party of Confederates who were trying to move on the fort. The Confederates were driven away. Jan. 10, 1861 Florida secedes from the Union on this date.. Union forces advanced on Port Royal and took possession of the Jan. 1, 1862 Confederate batteries after a short skirmish with the Confederate defense. The Federals were assisted by the gunboats which shelled the batteries from the shoreline. Capt. John H. Morgan led his 10 Confederate raiders to the town of Jan. 31, 1862 Lebanon, KY. When they arrived, Morgan discovered 3 Union supply wagons along with the Union mess crew. The Confederates captured the wagons and the entire 11man mess crew. The wagons contained food, clothing, telegraph instruments, and other stores. After loading up with all of the supplies that they could carry with them, they set fire to the remainder of the supplies, the local church, and the wagons. After this, the

Confederates left town, heading towards the Green River. Morgan had his men wear captured blue Union overcoats to fool any Union patrols that they might encounter. At Harpeth Shoals on the Cumberland River, the Union gunboat, USS Jan. 13, 1863

Jan. 21, 1863

Ian 7, 1864

Sidell, surrendered to Confederate troops, commanded by Brig. Gen. Joseph Wheeler. There were also 3 Union transports with wounded troops also seized. The wounded Union soldiers were put on board one ship and allowed to go on, while the other 3 ships were burned in place.

A Union forage train was travelling near Murfreesboro. A group of Confederate raiders surprised and attacked the forage train. After a very brief skirmish, the Confederates captured the train.

A lieutenant and a private of the 21st Georgia Cavalry captured 25 Union troops on Waccamaw Neck, located near Charleston.
