A FRATERNAL ORGANIZATION OF SOUTHERN MEN

THE SESQUICENTENNIAL OF OUR SOUTHERN WAR FOR INDEPENDENCE IS UNDERWAY

To begin our own observance of the Sesquicentennial, the Wade Hampton Camp had a delightful event at the Cayce Historical Museum with the theme: "Gone with the Wind." Susan Bray, the lovely wife of Compatriot Charles Bray molded two dresses which she had made. They were copies of dresses worn in the famous motion picture "GWTW". There was a re-enactment of the signing of the Ordinance of Secession and a candlelight tour of a trench used by Confederate troops trying desperately to stop, or at least slow down General Sherman's attack on Columbia.

The really big event was of course in Charleston, where there was a re-enactment of the signing of the Ordinance of Secession, followed by a banquet and a Confederate Ball, in which many of the participants dressed in uniforms, hoop skirts and period costumes. This took place on Monday, December 20, which was the actual date. South Carolina left the



Union in 1860. The reaction of most of South Carolina daily newspapers and TV news casts were quick in coming. They denounced the event as a celebration of slavery and treason. Charleston Mayor Joe Riley said it was a mockery to dance in celebrating slavery.

These reactions were a lie. They denied the reality of why South Carolina and later at least ten more states seceded and formed the Confederate States of America. Our Second American Revolution was not fought over slavery, but over States' Rights and the Constitution. The Lincoln regime was not paying attention to the Constitution in the way in which they handled the crisis. Lincoln made it obvious from the beginning that he wanted much higher taxes from the Southern States and especially higher tariffs on cotton and other Southern exports.

The very large crowd who attended the Confederate ball were all well aware of these facts, and they were indeed celebrating the heroism and rightness of their Southern heroes. For this reason, we need to have as many of our own events as possible during the Sesquicentennial, that we actually have control over most of them. Many of our enemies, including much of the media, and such groups as the Southern Poverty Law Center in Montgomery, Alabama, the NAACP, the NCAA and especially the National Park Service refuses to tell the truth about our Confederate ancestors.

Some leaders in the National Civil War Sesquicentennial Organization want it to be a solemn event, in which Southerners may remember their ancestors without glorifying them or celebrating them. Some want to use this observance as a time to say that the only reason for the war was to fight for slavery and make our ancestor's objects of ridicule. All this was predicted by our Confederate ancestors themselves.

Our enemies, who are slaves to political correctness, will do everything possible to turn our Sesquicentennial into Reconstruction 11. In fact, so many of those who oppose our principles refuse to use any argument except for slavery as a cause for the war. We must reply in the words of Wade Hampton. "If we were wrong in fighting for independence in 1861-65, then the Declaration of Independence of 1776 was a grave mistake and the Revolution was a crime. If George Washington was a patriot, Robert E. Lee cannot have been a rebel. If the Declaration of Independence made Thomas Jefferson immortal, the observance of it could not have made Jefferson Davis a traitor."

Secession was considered to be legal until at least 1860. Our Universities and Colleges taught that the states themselves formed the federal government, and therefore had a right to leave it, if attempts were made to change it. For example the New England states almost seceded during the War of 1812, because they were opposed to a second war against England. Had the Southern states been allowed to leave the Union in peace, slavery would have been ended before 1890. As early as the 1840s, many Southern Churches were teaching slaves how to read and write, because many of the Southern leaders knew that farm machinery would soon be invented that would make slavery unprofitable, and some farsighted Christians were beginning to prepare their slaves for this eventuality.

We must tell the truth during our Sesquicentennial. We must not give up our history or our signs and symbols. We must teach our children the truth about the South, and our courageous soldiers who fought for the American Constitution that was being trampled upon in

In a word, the world is a battle ground - Christianity and atheism are the combatants and eh progress of humanity is the stake."

During the War for Southern freedom, Thornwell gave many speeches and wrote several pamphlets to the soldiers and people of the South, predicting that if

the North won the war, "we would lose our freedom. We would be subject to a terrible occupation, in which we would be stripped of much of our property, and we would be reduced to being an irresponsible democracy. In short we would lose all that we hold most dear." In all of our reenactments and paying tribute to our Confederate heroes, and important events, we should heed Thornwell's words and those of other of our ancestors. They all tell us the truth about themselves. We must never dishonor our ancestors by giving in to the political correctness police. We must be true to our Southern heritage "till Gabriel blows his horn." €

Jan. 1, 1863: Confederates under Maj. Gen. John B. Magruder recapture

Galveston, Texas, routing three companies of the 42nd Massachusetts

Volunteer Infantry.

Jan. 2, 1863: Confederates and Federals battle at Stones River, Tenn., where more

than 23,000 soldiers are killed, wounded or captured in three days of

fighting.

Jan. 9, 1861: Citadel Cadets turn back The Star of the West, a Union ship loaded

with more than 200 Federal troops attempting to reinforce Fort

Sumter. This action was the first in the War Between the States.

Jan. 9, 1861: Mississippi secedes from the Union.

Jan. 10, 1861: Florida secedes from the Union.

Jan. 11, 1861: Alabama secedes from the Union.

Jan. 17, 1864: Southern forces under Lt. Gen. James Longstreet rebuff Federals at

Dandridge, Tenn., but are unable to pursue fleeing Yankees because

of a lack of supplies.

Jan. 19, 1861: Georgia secedes from the Union.

Jan. 26, 1861: Louisiana secedes from the Union.

Jan. 29, 1863: Union troops massacre Shoshoni Indians at Boa Ogoi, Idaho.
